Rene Harbison approved the March minutes and Dorothy Glosser seconded them. There were no objections regarding the Treasurer's report.

Our guest speaker was Jennifer Habecker from Around The Block at 309 East Main Street, Palmyra, NY 14552 (ATBQuilt.com) (<u>Aroundtheblockwithjenn@gmail.com</u>) (315-502-0026). She demonstrated the various blocks and usages for the Studio 180 tools she carries in her shop.

Sheryl Lynch's sweatshirt classes will be April 26 and June 1st. Since there is so much to accomplish with the jacket,

There needs to be 2 classes to complete the project. Sign up sheet at the front table. In May, Judy Phillips friend, Maria Pacheco, a retired chemistry professor and kumihimo enthusiast, will give a

patrons had questions regarding the group, so next year we should have brochures available.

Project Linus: Linda Szmanda challenged us to reach a goal of 7,000 quilts by the December meeting THIS YEAR.

The committee put crumb bags on the tables. Each bag should make a block a little larger than $10^{\prime\prime}$ and the

block returned should be trimmed to 10" square. The quilt total for this evening is 6,790, so that leaves 210

to go. That averages out to 3 each in the next 7 months. Thank you everyone for your continued

participation.

Picnic: will be held at the community center and it is pot luck. Again those who wish to participate, please make

place mats for Meals on Wheels of the Tonawandas. There will be prizes for winners of the competition.

Quilt Show: The first weekend of May, with set up May 2, 2025 and the show May 3-4, 2025. A suggestion was

with the vendors at the last show and all were very strongly opposed to a Friday and Saturday show.

Therefore, we will remain with a Saturday and Sunday show. Cheryl will contact the center to see if we can

be penciled in for the dates next year. Kelly Miller will be taking items for the basket raffle at the quilt show

when we get closer to the date. She would like a few more quilt related items. Raffle quilt is being worked on.

NYS Consortium: Cheryl Shoemaker and Judy Phillips participated in a zoom call. There are passports that can be

purchased for \$5.00 at quilt shops. We will see if we can list our show in next year's passports. There are

discounts at shops, lists of shows to go to and when you participate in the listed venues, your passport is

stamped and at the end of the year, you send them in and there are prizes. Members can also participate in

the $10^{\prime\prime}$ X $10^{\prime\prime}$ mini quilts. We can make them ourselves and sell them at our show, send them to the

consortium and they will put them up for sale and all proceeds go to scholarships. Any member is qualified

for a scholarship by applying, and you can receive a \$100 allotment to participate in a workshop or

conference. On October 12 & 13, 2024, there is the Best of New York Quilt show around Cayuga Lake.

Anyone can purchase a vendor booth. We can set up a booth in the Museum and sell raffle tickets for our

charity quilt. The website is: QCNYS.com.

Show and share was fabulous, as usual. The meeting was adjourned at 8:25 p.m.
